More Staff Stuff

Did vou know?

There is a city of Butterfield, Minnesota. According to Google, it is located in Watonwan County, in southwestern Minnesota, about 45 miles from Mankato, and is known as a link between Minneapolis / St. Paul, Minnesota and Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

According to its website, Butterfield's history is not neatly compiled in a book. Rather, it comes from memoirs and memory. It was incorporated in 1885 as a town platted by the railroad to entice homesteaders and merchants to settle there. The name Butterfield is said to come from a railroad engineer. Butterfield began with 17 people and grew to 634 just 100 years later and an estimated 602 in 2014.

How does this relate to New Hope? Good Question!! Butterfield was noted in a Weekly Memo as issuing tax-exempt bonds to help finance construction at Good Samaritan Society. So, The Roving Reporter asked the expert, Jeff Sargent, Director of Community Development, to explain. Here is what he said:

Non-profit organizations have the opportunity to pay a fee to cities in order for the city to sell tax-exempt bonds to help finance construction projects. In this case, Good Samaritan approached the city of Butterfield, and Butterfield agreed to sell bonds in order to generate the needed finances to construct the proposed Good Samaritan addition. Cities are able to obtain better interest rates on bonds, which is the reason why non-profit organizations do this.

So, now you know!

Food Donations Continue Strong

So far this year, the city has donated \$632 and 203 pounds of food to NEAR, the local food shelf.

Wacky Wednesdays have been a major contributor to the cash donations by allowing non-uniform staff to wear jeans or shorts that day in return for a \$5 donation. The next Wacky Wednesday is August 23.








Spotlight On...

For backpacking, Adam especially likes Glacier National Park. He spent a few days there last year. 


