To all city employees:


Mayor Kathi Hemken and Council Members Andy Hoffe and Eric Lammle have filed for the positions that will become vacant on December 31, 2016. Since there are only the three candidates (one for each opening), the city will not need to hold a primary for city offices. The general election is on November 8.


As most of you are aware, the city, its staff, and organizations providing city services, must remain impartial. Starting with me and extending to every employee of the city, the objective is to be completely fair with candidates by staying out of the politics of the race.

There are specific rules outlined in the Personnel Rules and Regulations pertaining to what an employee may and may not do regarding political activity. See page 2 for that excerpt. Bios of the candidates are on page 3.

It is up to the residents of the city to determine who they want to represent them on the council and it is our job to concentrate on giving the best service possible to the residents and to work with the officials who residents elect. They all deserve our respect.


From the city Personnel Rules & Regulations

Political Activity:

- a. Prohibited Activities. A City employee may not:
 1. Use official authority or influence for the purpose of interfering with or affecting the result of an election or nomination for office.
 2. During working hours solicit or receive funds for political purposes.
 3. At any time use their official authority or influence to compel any officer or employee in the classified service to:

apply for membership in or become a member of any political organization; or pay, promise to pay or lend any assessment, subscription, or contribution for political activity.
 4. Be a candidate for elective office in a public partisan election.

Any employee who violates these provisions is guilty of a misdemeanor and, if found guilty, is automatically separated from employment with the City.
- b. Permitted Activities. A City employee may:
 1. Express opinion on political subjects and candidates.
 2. Take an active part in political management and political campaigns.
 3. Hold membership or office in a political party, organization or club.
 4. Attend a political convention and participate in the deliberations of proceedings of the convention or any of its committees.
 5. Be a candidate for office or serve as a delegate at a convention as long as such candidacy does not involve a public partisan election.
 6. Engage in volunteer work for a partisan candidate, campaign, committee, political party or nominating convention of a political party.
 7. Sign nominating petitions for candidates in a partisan election for public office and originate or circulate such petitions.
 8. Make a financial contribution to a political party or organization and solicit and collect voluntary political contributions.




3 Candidate Bios

Mayor Kathi Hemken was elected to her first term as mayor in 2008 and reelected in 2012. She has been a resident of New Hope for 33 years.

Hemken's community involvement includes New Hope Planning Commission member and chair, Northwest YMCA board member, New Hope Women of Today (chair of Duk Duk Daze festival), League of Women Voters of Crystal, New Hope, and East Plymouth board member.

Hemken is a retired production control supervisor at Honeywell. She has a B.S. degree from the University of Minnesota.



Council member Andy Hoffe was elected to City Council in 2004 and reelected in 2008 and 2012. He has been a resident of New Hope for 35 years.

Hoffe's community involvement includes Northwest Community Television. He also attends District 281 Government Advisory Council meetings and other city commission meetings.

Hoffe is a retired District 281 government and economics teacher at Robbinsdale and Cooper high schools. He is an active substitute teacher for the district. He has a B.A. degree in social studies and business education.

Council member Eric Lammle was elected to his first term in 2008 and reelected in 2012. He has been a resident of New Hope for 13 years.

Lammle's community involvement includes serving on the West Metro Fire Rescue District Board of Directors, Winnetka Green Homeowners Association president, and Police Explorer advisor.

Lammle is a patrol sergeant with the Richfield Police Department. He has a B.A. degree in sociology of law and criminology from the University of Minnesota.



Minnesota GreenStep Cities

New Hope Reaches Step 3

The GreenStep Cities program is a voluntary plan that helps cities achieve their sustainability and quality of life goals. New Hope city council passed a resolution to participate in the Minnesota GreenStep City program in January 2015.

New Hope reached Steps 1 and 2 last year and has now reached "Step 3" which requires the implementation of 16 or more Best Practices, including some specific Best Practice Actions. Completed actions include entering energy use data from city-owned buildings into the Minnesota B3 database, adopting an environmentally preferred purchase policy, organizing and reporting goals/outcome measures from all city plans, and implementing a computer power management system. The city has now completed 18 of 29 Best Practices and 69 of 175 Best Practice Actions.

Mayor Hemken and Community Development Assistant Jeff Alger accepted the "Step 3" award on June 15, 2016, at the League of Minnesota Cities' annual conference in St. Paul. Thanks are extended to Jeff Alger for all his work on this program!

Of the 109 cities that participate in the Minnesota GreenStep Cities Program, 23 have reached "Step 3" and six have reached the newly implemented "Step 4."



Another love of Jan's is golf and she makes time for a league every year. Perhaps next year she will join one at the New Hope Golf Course.

10 Fireworks and 4th of July

With warm weather and family events, the Fourth of July can be a fun time with great memories. But before your family celebrates, make sure everyone knows about fireworks safety.

If not handled properly, fireworks can cause burn and eye injuries in kids and adults. The best way to protect your family is not to use any fireworks at home — period. Attend public fireworks displays, and leave the lighting to the professionals.

The only legal fireworks in Minnesota are sparklers, fountains, ground spinners and snap-pers.

Here are some safety tips:

- * **Kids should never play with fireworks.** Things like firecrackers, rockets, and sparklers are just too dangerous. If you give kids sparklers, make sure they keep them outside and away from the face, clothing, and hair. Sparklers can reach 1,800°F (982°C) — hot enough to melt gold.
- * **Buy only legal fireworks** (legal fireworks have a label with the manufacturer's name and directions; illegal ones are unlabeled), and store them in a cool, dry place. Illegal fireworks usually go by the names M-80, M100, blockbuster, or quarterpounder. These explosives were banned in 1966, but still account for many fireworks injuries.
- * **Never try to make your own fireworks.**
- * **Always use fireworks outside and have a bucket of water** and a hose nearby in case of accidents.
- * **Steer clear of others** — fireworks have been known to backfire or shoot off in the wrong direction. Never throw or point fireworks at someone, even in jest.
- * **Don't hold fireworks in your hand** or have any part of your body over them while lighting. Wear some sort of eye protection, and avoid carrying fireworks in your pocket — the friction could set them off.
- * **Point fireworks away** from homes, and keep away from brush and leaves and flammable substances. The National Fire Protection Association estimates that local fire departments respond to more 50,000 fires caused by fireworks each year.
- * **Light one firework at a time** (not in glass or metal containers).
- * **Never relight a dud.**
- * **Don't allow kids to pick up pieces of fireworks** after an event. Some may still be ignited and can explode at any time.
- * **Soak all fireworks in a bucket of water before throwing them in the trash can.**
- * **Think about your pet.** Animals have sensitive ears and can be extremely frightened or stressed on the Fourth of July. Keep pets indoors to reduce the risk that they'll run loose or get injured.

If a child is injured by fireworks:

Immediately go to a doctor or hospital. If an eye injury occurs, don't allow your child to touch or rub it, as this may cause even more damage. Also, don't flush the eye out with water or attempt to put any ointment on it. Instead, cut out the bottom of a paper cup, place it around the eye, and immediately seek medical attention — your child's eyesight may depend on it. If it's a burn, remove clothing from the burned area and run cool, not cold, water over the burn (do not use ice). Call your doctor immediately.

Fireworks are meant to be enjoyed, but you'll enjoy them much more knowing your family is safe. **Take extra precautions this Fourth of July and your holiday will be a blast!**


