Sergeant Williams Retires

Marty had never heard of New Hope before he was encouraged by a Brooklyn Center officer to apply for the cadet program operated by Crystal, Robbinsdale, New Hope, Brooklyn Center and Brooklyn Park in 1993. As he retires on August 31, Marty's presence at events and on the streets will be missed by his coworkers and the thousands of residents he has interacted with over the last almost 30 years.

Marty worked for Minnesota Public Housing Authority when he was hired as part-time cadet in '93. One day while still working for MPHA, he had a young resident of MPHA tell him that he wanted to be a police officer when he grew up. These words have stayed with Marty over the years. He knew that his goal was to be a role model and inspiration for youth of color, but he had assumed it would be in Minneapolis where he had spent the second half of his youth. However, because of his participation in the cadet program, when it was time for him to become an officer, he submitted applications, interviewed and had his choice of working for Robbinsdale or New Hope. He looked hard at what each department offered, and even though New Hope had several opportunities that drew him in, he admitted that he still had his doubts, as he would be the first person of color in the

He did make that choice though and was hired and then promoted to a full-time cadet in 1995, before becoming an officer in August of 1996. He said he made the right choice. When he was hired, there was one other person of color hired as well, and he said he was welcomed without hesitation by his coworkers. Over the years, he has held two assignments as a school resource officer and two three-year assignments as an investigator. He has also been an Explorer advisor and worked with the ATF. In May of 2014, he was promoted to sergeant, the position he serves in today. Marty feels he has had a great career here at New Hope. He feels blessed that New Hope and he chose each other so many years ago.


