Park/Pool Construction Update

Even before city hall was vacated, the demolition company began evaluation for asbestos and soon after started demolition of the old city hall. They had already moved in as close as they could to the building so it was only a matter of weeks before the building was gone. Here is the status of construction:

- Exterior brick on the bathhouse is going up.
- Final walls for the 50-meter pool have been poured.
- Foundation and walls for the mechanical building are being poured.
- Block work for the theatre has started, electrical has been roughed, steel columns set.
- Planning to install steel for the picnic shelter within the next week or two.
- Skate park concrete has started.

Police Station & City Hall Construction Update

Starting on June 27 the city hall move began in earnest. The moving company

arrived in the morning and started to transport the previously loaded totes and shelves to the new facility. Employees worked at the old site directing the movers and at the new site unpacking. All the while, crews continued with finishing touches on the new building. Staff and Solution Builders worked through the weekend making sure that the building was open for business on Monday morning, July 1. They also worked to remove anything from the old building that could be repurposed. Much of the furniture was repurposed either in the new building or in park and recreation facilities throughout the city. West Metro Fire was also able to repurpose some equipment for training purposes.

In the new building, while there are still a few items yet to be finished and learned, daily operations feel to be back to

normal. Visitors from both within the city and without have lauded staff with compliments on the new space. Much gratitude is owed to staff from throughout the city in helping to plan, move and modify the space to make it a functional and beautiful place to work. Special thanks to public works for the many trips before and after the move to remove and replace items. A grand opening will be planned for the fall once a completion date of the parking lot is known. Concrete pouring of the sidewalks began last week.

First Council Meeting

City Council and staff held their first council meeting in the new building on July 22. Several residents attended and the new space worked well for council members and staff alike.

City Project Updates

In addition to the construction happening at Civic Center Park, there are many other projects ongoing throughout the city.

- New street lights have been installed on 42nd Avenue between Louisiana and Xylon avenues with new banners as well.
- The Winpark Drive reconstruction is progressing despite rain delays due to the wet season early on in construction.
- The Jaycee Park playground equipment has been installed and site work completed. Turf needs to be established.
- The Windsor Ridge development is well underway. Three building permits have been issued for new homes and the developer hopes to have them ready for occupation before the end of the year.
- The new construction at the 5212 Pennsylvania Avenue scattered site location will proceed once the lot sale is approved.
- The contract for the scattered site rehab project at 3924 Utah Avenue has been approved and rehabilitation is proceeding.
- The Hy-Vee drive-thru kiosk on the west side of the current building has been approved and construction will occur
 this fall.
- Lastly, but not least, the 2020 preliminary budget has been completed and will be reviewed in detail with the city council over the next several months before final adoption in December.

Hands-Free: Now the Law in Minnesota

Governor Tim Walz signed a new hands-free cell phone bill into law April 12 to help further reduce distractions behind the wheel.

Starting Aug. 1, drivers are no longer be able to hold their cell phones in their hands. They are able to use their phones to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single touch activation without holding the phone.

Remember, hands-free is not necessarily distraction-free. We want Minnesotans to stay safe, stay alive and stay out of trouble under the new law.

MINNESOTA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

What can I do under the new law?

The new law allows a driver to use their cell phone to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single-touch activation without holding the phone.

What can't I do with my phone under the new law?

You may not hold your phone in your hand. Also, a driver may not use their phone at any time for video calling, video live-streaming, Snapchat, gaming, looking at video or photos stored on the phone, using non-navigation apps, reading texts and scrolling or typing on the phone.

Can I ever hold my phone?

Yes. Hand-held phone use is allowed to obtain emergency assistance, if there is an immediate threat to life and safety, or when in an authorized emergency vehicle while performing official duties.

Can I use a GPS navigation device?

Yes. GPS and other systems that can only be used for navigation are exempt from the Hands-Free law. In-car screens and systems are also exempt. In both cases, most of these systems lock when the vehicle is moving.

If my teen is under 18 years old and has a driver's permit or provisional driver's license, can they use their phone in hands-free mode?

The new hands-free law does not change anything for teens under 18 with a driver's permit or provisional driver's license: They cannot make or answer calls while driving (hand-held or hands-free).

Does the new hands-free law address smart watches?

Drivers can use them as a conventional watch to check time, but smart watches are considered an electronic communications device under the hands-free law. That means the device has the same restrictions as a cell phone. Drivers can use a smart watch the same way they use a cell phone as long as it's by one-touch or voice activation. Drivers can't type, text or do the other things prohibited under the hands-free law.

Does the new law apply to law enforcement agencies?

Under the new law, hand-held phone use is allowed in an authorized emergency vehicle while performing official duties. However, some agencies have taken a proactive approach to reduce or eliminate hand-held phone use. For example, the Minnesota State Patrol has instituted a policy that requires troopers to use their phones only in hands-free mode.

Unfortunately, there are circumstances in which emergency vehicle drivers need to be on their devices to carry out their duties. Although this is different than situations other drivers find themselves in, the dangers are the same. We're well aware of those dangers from a law enforcement perspective and are encouraging people to follow the law regardless of whether they have an exemption.

Couldn't I get distracted by my in-car screen or other distractions like eating, grooming, pets, passengers or reading a book? Why aren't they covered?

Yes, there are many possible distractions when driving, but cell phone use presents a unique and complex challenge and is addressed by the hands-free law. A driver is still expected to avoid other distractions and drive with due care under other Minnesota traffic laws.

Are there penalties?

Yes. The first ticket is \$50 plus court fees and the second and later tickets are \$275 plus court fees.


Upcoming Events
