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
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#### **Employee Service Recognition Event**

# 2021 Budget Process Almost Completed

The New Hope City Council adopted the 2021 preliminary budget and tax levy at its meeting on Sept. 14 and has been reviewing all department budgets over the last several months.

The preliminary 2021 general fund budget is \$15,936,977, which is an increase of \$526,427 (3.4%) over the 2020 budget.

Major changes in the 2021 budget include:

- \$243,524 increase to fund 3% increase in wages/benefits; increase in Council salaries
- \$156,000 increase for Phase 1 of police department body and squad camera purchases (funded by IT reserve)
- \$85,288 increase for West Metro Fire-Rescue District (\$54,673 for JPA; \$33,265 for new shared emergency generator replacement charge)
- \$57,427 increase in central garage charges based on equipment replacement
- \$49,000 increase in city hall budget due to \$24,000 replacement cost for new generator, increases in utility costs (\$22,000) and liability insurance (\$17,000) for larger building
- \$60,000 decrease in elections budget; 2021 is not an election year

The preliminary total tax levy for the entire 2021 budget, including all funds and debt payments, is \$17,417,601, which is an increase of \$572,885 or 3.4% higher than 2020.

Although the tax levy is increasing by 3.4%, the city's tax capacity has also increased and the estimated tax rate is expected to decrease from 64.72% to 62.47%. The estimated impact to property owners is a 2% increase.

The public hearing to take input from residents took place on Dec. 7 and the Council is scheduled to consider the final budget and tax levy for approval at the Dec. 14 council meeting.

If you are thinking of suggestions for gifts, the group that is typically overlooked is teenage boys and girls. The Sun Post ran an article on Sept. 17, 2020 about Tim's Sept. 30 retirement. And while we don't want to be repetitive, there are some things worth repeating and a few questions closer to the city that the Jolly Journalist asked...

Tim joined the city as a firefighter on Feb. 7, 1987 and worked here until 1990. After working as a police officer in Richfield he returned in September 1993 as a New Hope officer, was promoted to sergeant in June of 1999 and finally to police chief in May 2011. Over the years, he was a colleague, mentor and friend to many within and outside of the

department. He helped navigate the department and city through some intense and difficult times. Here is some of what he had to share as he stepped out of a department he had been a part of for 27 years...

*Given the chance, would you do things differently?* No, I wouldn't change things. Of course there are both wonderful and painful memories associated with this job, but I feel I've had a fulfilling career in which I've pushed myself and when given the opportunity, I've done the same for others.

Do you feel that the career you chose made a difference in how you've lived or made you see the world? Yes. I considered a career in the private sector years ago, but I'm glad I made this choice. I feel

you should always learn from your experiences. I've learned to see the world through other's eyes. I feel I've been able to provide a safer environment for others (citizens, fellow employees) directly through work with the city and for others in my life as all the training and experience certainly made me more alert and aware of my environment and situation. I've certainly become a humbler person through service to the community. And while in law enforcement there is a temptation to see the glass half-empty, it is important you fight to see it half-full.

What do you take pride in? Definitely the new police station and city hall. The desire was to create a work environment the employees would enjoy working in and while it was a long, hard job I feel we were successful. As a leader I always strived to improve things for employees and provide opportunities to fulfill their own career aspirations.

What advice would you share with colleagues? Make sure you have outside interests in life. At some point you will retire or leave the job and you'll need new passions to pursue.

What are your favorite memories? The simple, daily interactions with colleagues when comradery was palpable: roll calls, meals together, team-building outside of work. You are definitely part of a larger family. The friendships I've developed along the way are very important to me and will endure for life.

Do you have anything else you would like to share in closing? I still remember my first day on the job. It truly feels like it was yesterday. I also wish I could have planned a larger retirement celebration with my fellow officers, friends, and family.



That last month went too fast. It would have been nice to have more time with colleagues, both formally and informally over the final weeks. That being said I am grateful for what I had and thankful to have made it to retirement.
